







## What's On That Shelf There? Warner Library's Little Free Library

In late September we opened our Little Free Library, partially in response to an opinion article in *The Waltonian*, and partially in response to sporadic donations that don't always fit in our collection. We are an academic library, and our primary goal is to provide students, faculty, staff and alumni access to scholarly materials. We are fortunate to have a generous donor, and some funds set aside for Young Adult and leisure reading material; however, it's not within our purpose or funding to acquire whatever is currently trending on a consistent basis. This is where the Little Free Library comes in.

What is it?: While walking or driving in suburban areas, you may have seen these little houses full

of books. These are Little Free Libraries. People set them up in front of their homes, places of worship or businesses, and fill them with books that they have already read, or otherwise no longer wish to keep. Other people come along and take them to read. Ideally, they bring books they no longer wish to keep to replace the ones they take: but this is not required.

Where is it?: Warner's Little Free Library is on the main floor, located near the charging station and close to the lounge in front of the check out desk. Conveniently placed for your leisure reading needs!

What ends up in there?: Currently, we have a number of Advanced Reader Copies that we acquired from the American Library Association Convention that three of our librarians attended over the summer. Advanced Reader Copies are put out by the publisher to help generate buzz for a book before it comes out. The contents inside may change before publication. As cool as some of these books are, we can't add them to our collection. But, because students might like them, we added them to the Little Free Library.

Personally, I am a horror reader, and I'm not above being influenced. There are things I've read that I don't imagine I will return to once I'm done reading it. While I can make a case that *Tender Is The Flesh* by Agustina Bazterrica should

be added to our collection—because it is being written about by scholars and it's been BookTok's horror pick for a hot minute—I can't say the same for *everything* I read. It may be too niche to add to our collection. I also get a fair amount of books second hand, so they may not be in the ideal condition to add to the official library. So, into the Little Free Library it goes!

In short, if you see something you like, take it. Don't worry about checking it out. Just take it. If you have something you're done with and don't care to hold onto, bring it in.

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
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
We had requests to acquire a graphic novel version of *The Odyssey* (since we have *The Iliad*, after all), *The Ballad of Songbirds & Snakes* and *Sunrise on the Reaping*, both by Suzanne Collins. *The Odyssey* was recently added to our collection, and we are currently working on completing series we've already started in our collection, such as *The Hunger Games*. We do have both Collins' titles as <u>eBooks</u>, however, if you don't want to wait—see the last page of this newsletter for more details!

There were also requests for <u>Mockingjay Part 2</u>, <u>The Diary of Anne Frank</u>, and a <u>white noise machine</u>. We already have one white noise machine in our <u>Library Of Things</u>. If it starts circulating more, we will look into adding a second or third. However, we already have <u>Mockingjay Part 2</u> (as a DVD and in its original book form including <u>Part 1</u>) and <u>Diary Of A Young Girl</u> (Anne Frank's diary).




You asked—we delivered! A graphic novel that we added, a classic we have three copies of (including as an ebook!), and an item we're willing to get more of!


