





Eagle Search now has “Map It” feature

Have you ever looked up a print book or DVD in Eagle Search, but had no idea where to find it on the shelf? That will no longer be an issue, now that Warner Library’s Eagle Search has “Map It.” Now when you look up a print book or physical item located in the library building itself, you will find a “Map It” button next to the call number. A new window will open, highlighting the shelf where the item is located. Here’s an example of what to look for:




5 Out of 5 Librarians Recommend... Books We Suggest You Read For Women's History Month!

Our latest column titled "5 Out of 5 Librarians Recommend" is where we tell you about specific titles that we think you'd like to read. This issue, we'll be recommending books that were written by or about women, due to March being Women's History Month. Be sure to stop by the library when you get back to tell us what you thought!




Anne Schwelm, Director of the Library: "I have two picks for this month. [The Personal Librarian](#) is the remarkable true story of Belle da Costa Greene, who curated the rare book collection of financier J. P. Morgan, head of the banking firm that ultimately became known as JPMorgan Chase. Forced to hide her black heritage in deeply segregated early 20th-century America, Belle helped build one of the most important rare book and manuscript collections in the world. My second pick, [Infidel](#), is the story of Ayaan Hirsi Ali who grew up in Somalia and Saudi Arabia. After undergoing beatings and female mutilation, she questions her strict religious upbringing and flees from a forced marriage to the Netherlands to seek political asylum. Disowned by her father and under constant threat of becoming a victim of an 'honor killing', Ali graduates from college, becomes a member of Parliament who fights for the rights of women."

Caroline Coriell, Information Literacy Librarian: "My book pick for the month is [The Haunting Of Hill House](#) by Shirley Jackson. Did you like Mike Flannigan's Netflix series of the same name? Read the book that inspired it. I picked this book because it's one of the best books I've read in the last five years. Jackson is a master at what she does. The tension builds wonderfully, and Eleanor is such an interesting character to follow. Jackson herself is also a fascinating person who wrote several books featuring flawed and compelling female characters, such as Natalie in *Hangsaman* and the sisters Constance and Mary Katherine ('Merricat') in [We Have Always Lived In The Castle](#)."



Chelsea Post, Systems Librarian: "The first in The Fireborn Epic, [Of Fire and Ash](#) tells the rich story of Ceridwen tal Desmond, daughter of the chief who is exiled after the death of her twin brother before being thrust back into the kingdom when civil war grips the land. The aforementioned fireborn is her magical, fire-breathing steed, one of several breeds that each possess a variety of magical powers, from flight to disappearing into shadows. Ceridwen's story weaves into two other points of view that eventually become the focus in later novels of the series: but the first had me hooked right from the beginning, and if you're looking for masterful world building and fully-realized characters, then you've come to the right book."

Kathy Hecht, Access Services Librarian: "Here are my recent recommendations for books with women authors: 1) [The Women](#), by Kristen Hannah, a fictionalized account of women serving in Vietnam; and 2) [Nobody's Girl](#) by Virginia Roberts Guiffre, a difficult to read memoir by one of Jeffrey Epstein's victims."



Robyn Cunningham, Reference Librarian: "My book suggestion for ladies' night is *Love and Other Conspiracies* by Mallory Marlowe. I've been enjoying lighthearted romances, and this is a perfect one that can tie in with a chill ladies' night (as well as our monster-themed March Madness event!). The story follows online video producer Hallie as she begins working alongside cryptid researcher Hayden, all while a budding romance begins to emerge. It's silly, not too serious, and perfect for a fun night with friends. You can check it out from the [Free Library of Philadelphia](#)."

Dear Camera Shy,

The library website links to several databases where you can search images and use them without paying for them, and without worrying about copyright restrictions. In contrast to using Google Images, where the copyright could be murky and you may not have permission to use an image, using these to build your PowerPoint, poster or project will always be permitted.

Go to the library website, choose Databases, then in databases, type "choose Images." You have the choice of 11 databases. My favorites are [Artstor](#) for photos and artistic images and [Image Quest](#) for photos and illustrations.

For example, I went to Artstor and searched for "cat" and found this cartoon of a cat funeral.



The listing tells the usage parameters and if it is in the public domain, there are no copyright restrictions.



Going over to the Image Quest database and searching "cat," I found this alluring picture. MeeOW! Its copyright is by [@Photo Researchers](#). In the notes it says its copyright is 'educational use only' which means you can use it in projects or school related things, but can't put it in your own published works.



Happy searching. Make it gorgeous.




