This year we have a new addition to our main stacks: the Social / Racial Justice Collection! Located on the main level, these four bookcases can be found between the computer area and the atrium.


Like many colleges and universities, Eastern University recognized the need to respond to the racial reckoning that was happening in this country during the summer of 2021. As an institution, the university prides itself on a legacy of Biblical belief that is active in making the world a more righteous and just place. Within the campus community, Warner Memorial is included in the institutional commitment to social and racial justice. Library director Joy Dlugosz recognized the need for a creative response; and thus, the social & racial justice collection was born.




To make these materials most useful, we wanted to make them easily searchable. The stacks are organized by LC call number like the rest of the library. The digital catalog allows users to filter results by collection - just select "SOCIAL RACIAL JUSTICE."


In curating the materials that make up the collection, it is important that there is a broad selection. For that reason, it includes children's and young adult materials in addition to DVDs from our media collection.


Encompassing a diverse array of titles and authors, these materials are united by a theme of addressing social issues. It includes resources on economic inequality, disability, sexuality, environmentalism and criminal justice. We have popular titles like *Woke Church* by Eric Mason and classics like *Narrative of the Life of Frederick Douglass*.















Some example titles in the Social/Racial Justice Collection of the library!














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- 3. If you're on campus, click "here."


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New database added: World Bank Data





This semester we have acquired a new database: <u>World Bank Data</u>. The World Bank is a financial institution which provides resources to developing countries in order to aid their economy and society. Their data is sourced from their own analysis, self-reporting by various nations and other NGOs.

World Bank Data provides specially curated datasets which analyze indicators of a country and/or region's economic development. Users can browse topically or explore different collections.

Data can be used in various downloadable file formats in addition to viewing in Data Bank and WDI tables. Data Bank displays information in customizable tables, charts and maps. It also provides a summary of the countries and variables used in the analysis. The WDI tables tool displays World Development Indicators in a spreadsheet format listed by country and includes special categories of global regions and income brackets.

Additional features of Data Bank include links to other open access databases, the ability to create and save reports

using data from the website, access to reports made by other databank users to help structure your own, a place for users to save datasets when compiling sources, and a list of key terms to explain commonly used variables.

The WDI collection also includes key data points across focus areas; Poverty and shared prosperity; People; Environment; Economy; States and markets; and Global links.

In addition to the breadth of data available, a great functionality of the World Bank Data database is its graphs and charts which provide eye-catching and easy to understand analysis.


